Common methods for addressing need

Is God pleased that while specific needs are being met, most people who receive help continue to live in a state of need?

“Open eyes that are blind, free captives from prison and release from the dungeon those who sit in darkness.” Isaiah 43:7

Bill Hybels says we move people not by just casting a great vision of where we should go, but also by painting a clear picture of why we can't stay where we are.

Change is usually a result of one of two things:

1. We desire things to be different so we seek it out
2. We no longer can stay status quo and change is forced upon us

Statistics:

U.S. Census Bureau

- 13.5% people live in poverty – an estimated 43.1 million people
- An additional 31%, over 100 million people, are labeled as low income
- 1 out of every 5 children are on food stamps
- 65% of all children live in a home that receives some type of government assistance
- An average of 46 million Americans use foodbanks

History:

There is a lack of knowledge in the biblical call to wholistic help

Focus shifted from people to need

People living in chronic need, generational poverty, live compromised lives

Part #4 – Training to do Kingdom Work:

We cannot continue to keep trying to do Kingdom work – it's time for the church to train to do Kingdom work.

We are called to relieve those in poverty, not just feed those in poverty

- Feeding without teaching creates dependency

We are called to help people thrive not merely survive

- To free people from the bondage of their need

We are called to wholistically help the whole person

- We should look for the potential within a person, not just meet their need

Part #5 – Six Core Principles of Redemptive Compassion:

Based on six core principles:

1. We see everyone's value
2. We invest relationally in others
3. We help everyone achieve their God-given potential
4. We require mutual contribution and participation
5. We respond with wisdom and discernment
6. We serve in ways that transform
